

Are You In Need Of Spiritual Direction?

The ministry of Spiritual Direction is time set apart from the world with a spiritual director/guide to discuss God's actions in one's life. Through the Holy Spirit, the seeker

and the director discern God's direction for him/

The values one can gain in spiritual direction are assisting in listening to God's voice within

their life, growing in knowing God and self, becoming aware of God's presence in all aspects of daily life, and deepening one's prayer life and communion with God, among others.

If you are experiencing a new sense of God in your life, feel distant from God, have a desire to deepen your relationship with God, spiritual direction would be something you may want to explore.

A typical spiritual direction session would be 45 minutes to an hour of your time, every 2 weeks or once a month. All spiritual directors have been in training from 1-3 years

and seek continuing education for this ministry. Most spiritual directors do not impose a fee, however, any type of love offering is

accepted and appreciated.

Without many parishioners who visit our table knowing the history of the Small Faith Ministry, we have had many questions regarding the

name: Thursday Morning "Small" Faith Group. Questions such as, "why do you have small faith?"

Well, we do not. Our faith is very strong, and so is our

When I joined the Ministry in 2008, I was told that the group began, during the "Renew" period of the church in the 1990's. St. Mark's Group was established in 1991. The membership in these "small" breakout groups would meet in people's homes. Thus, the word "small" described the "size" of the groups...

not their faith. When the church allowed these small groups to meet on church property, they kept the name!

Now, in our efforts to invite new members, we have received ap-

proval from pastoral staff and voted to remove the word "small" as many visitors to our Ministry Fair tables or readers of our articles in the bulletin are confused as to what the group

does, or they confuse us with other semester style groups, who meet for a specific number of weeks. We meet all year.

In the past we had as many as 25+ members. Today, our group is much smaller, as the original members have moved away, and recruiting is not easy. So we are inviting new members to join us. What we do prepares us for the weekend

Masses by using our study materials. We cover the two readings from the Bible, the responsorial psalms, and the Gospel, which are in our study guide, and other materials provided in our pamphlets. They are reflections on the readings and Gospel. This allows us to discuss what the readings and Gospel mean to us in a round table setting. Everyone gets to speak. It is very enlightening. After our meetings on Thursday morning, we are prepared for the weekend with the knowledge of what we will hear during Mass. We will have had the chance to ask questions and discuss in our class. We have fun and are inspired in learning something new every week and in hearing the Word of God spoken in our midst.

Seminarian Rafael Becerra at St. Mark

St. Mark the Evangelist is pleased to welcome Seminarian Rafaél Becerra, a student at Assumption Seminary, who will be collaborating with the Liturgy Department this semester as part of his formation.

Following is his bio:

"I'm Rafaél Becerra, a Seminarian at Assumption Seminary who

is studying Theology at Oblate School of Theology for the Archdiocese of San Antonio. I am from Tepatitlán, Jalisco, México. I am 37 years old, and come from a large and beautiful family. My father José is 70 years old and retired, and my mother Agustina is 68 years old. We were ten children, four boys and six girls: Juan Carlos, Moisés,

María Angélica, Lorena, Ana Rosa (who is my twin sister), Gabriela, Patricia, and María Guadalupe. Moisés died in 2003. Juan Carlos and José Francisco live in Madison, Wisconsin. All my sisters live in Mexico. I have 22 nephews and nieces and four grandnephews.

I have a bachelor's degree in

International Business from the University of Guadalajara and a Master's Degree in Politics and Public Administration from ITESO (Jesuit University of Guadalajara). I worked for the government for about ten years in my city and in the Governor's office. I produced a TV Show at Maria Visión, which is a Catholic Channel in Latin America and had two radio shows in Guadalajara. I created a young movement through the country named "Dilo Bien" (Say

it right), which defends life, family, justice, and peace. I felt the call from God when I was 31 years old. At that point in my life, I considered myself very successful, and I thought that I had responded to everything God asked of me. But, I asked him, "What else do you want from me?" Finally, I felt the call from God to become a priest; I gave up everything, including my fiancé, and

went to the San Juan de Los Lagos Seminary, which currently has 370 seminarians.

I was very happy, but again I was feeling a new call from God because the vocation is never finished. We always need to renew our answer. I asked God what else; I felt that He was calling me to go to the United

States. With my Spiritual Director's help, when I completed my Philosophy degree, I decided to renounce San Juan de Los Lagos Seminary. For some months, I was praying to God to help me, to open a new door, or to show me the place where He wants me to be. So, here I am, in San Antonio, which is the city where God has brought me. I have been delighted throughout this year at Assumption Seminary. We can only find fullness when we respond to what God asks of us. Only God is sufficient."

Rafael also received his Ministry of Reader at Assumption Seminary. Bishop Gerald Barnes celebrated that Mass.

The competition was strong as students from nine different area high schools applied for scholarships from the St. Mark Women's Guild and the Knights of Columbus.

The selection process uses twenty evaluators, ten from each of the two organizations. The students are evaluated on speaking ability by a six-member team and on writing ability by six evaluators. Students are also evaluated on their school activities. community activities, such as scouts or parttime employment, and church activities.

Applicants had their choice from two essay topics:

1. What can be done to increase youth participation in the commu-

nity of St. Mark the Evangelist?
2. Some presidential candidates are espousing socialism for the United States. Should this form of

government be adopted for the United States? Why or why not?

While some points are allocated for academic performance, the greatest emphasis is placed on church activities.

Called and Gifted by Jesus

Lent has been a privileged time to reflect on the significance of baptism and what it means to walk as a disciple of Jesus Christ, one who has been called to walk in the footsteps of the Master. As the catechumens and candidates have prepared for the Easter Vigil, so has the entire community had the opportunity to renew their sense of being baptized into Christ and living as a part of His body, the Church.

The deepening of our shared vocation arises from the conviction that Christ is alive! The celebrations of Jesus's resurrection from the dead and the sending of His Spirit challenge us to live in this truth: He is alive within us through the power of the Spirit, empowering us to continue His action in the world. And one manner in which these graces act in us is through *charisms*.

The Catherine of Siena Institute explains charisms as follows: "Charism" is the Greek word used in the New Testament for 'favor' or 'gratuitous gift'. Charisms, or spiritual gifts, are special abilities given to all Christians by the Holy Spirit to give them power both to represent Christ and to be a channel of God's goodness for people. Whether extraordinary or ordinary, all charisms ought to be exercised in the service of God (CCC 2003)."

These charisms are a key part of St. Paul's experience and teaching in the early Church: "There are different kinds of spiritual gifts but the same Spirit... to each individual the manifestation of the Spirit is given for some benefit (1 Cor. 12:4-7)."

"To each individual..." that means you and every baptized person you know! So, beyond being called to discipleship and mission, we are also gifted with the spiritual gifts necessary to carry out that call. But these gifts must be explored and discerned. And that is precisely what a small group in our community has been up to for the past few months! By walking through the

Called & Gifted Discernment Process we have been reflecting on God's action in our lives and learning about charisms.

As Sherry A. Weddell states in her seminal work *Forming Intentional Disciples*, "Our parishes need to become places where it is normal for adult Catholics to ask, 'What is God calling me to?" And discernment of our charisms is a crucial step in hearing the answer to that all-important question.




Supper Club for Summer Camps: A Swanky Success Story

At this point in our Lenten journey, it is tempting to grow weary of the spiritual disciplines we have taken on. The readings inspire us to remain faithful, in grateful response to a God who loves us so much. What's more, these readings give us wonderful guidance on just how to make this grateful response.

Ezekiel the prophet speaks God's own words to us. "I will put my spirit in you that you may live... I have promised, and I will do it, says the Lord." Our God wants only goodness for us. He wants to be so closely united to us that we are one with Him. He has promised He will do it, but only if we allow Him. He will not force His way into our lives. That would not be loving and God is Love itself. We must invite Him in. We must make room for Him by making Him THE priority of our lives. Putting God first is a grateful response that is very pleasing to Him.

How can we please God by putting Him first? St. Paul's letter to the Romans gives us good instruction. "Those who are in the flesh cannot please God. But you are not in the flesh... you are in the spirit, if only the Spirit of God dwells in you." To be "in the flesh" means that we allow our own selves — our whims, our pleasure, our comfort-seeking — to determine our daily decisions. To be "in the flesh" is to spend our time, talent, and material gifts primarily on ourselves. When we are in the flesh, we leave no room for the Spirit of God to fill our thoughts, our hearts, and our souls.

The disciplines of Lent and the disciplines of a stewardship way of life are wonderful gifts that free us from too great an attachment to "the flesh." The sacrifices we make

in a particular way during this holy season and every day when we truly embrace a stewardship way of life are not meant to restrict our freedom and joy. Quite the contrary — they are tools to help us find the real freedom and joy that only come when we make room in our lives for God. In fact, the more we allow God to take over every aspect of our lives, the freer and more joyful we become.

Our loving God is always ready to renew His Spirit within us whenever we find ourselves led astray by the temptation to selfishness. The Gospel passage from John recounts Jesus' raising of His friend, Lazarus, from the dead. In Jesus' poignant reaction to the death of Lazarus and the grief of his sisters, we see once again how closely our God identifies with us and all of our sufferings and burdens. His tenderness and compassion teach us that we can safely surrender our lives to Him knowing that He will care for us. His raising of Lazarus from the dead demonstrates His power over all things, even death itself, reminding us that it would be foolish not to surrender to such an awesome God!

As we journey ever closer to the powerful days of Palm Sunday, Holy Week, and the Passion and Resurrection of our Lord, let us intensify our Lenten resolutions and our stewardship way of life. Let us invite the Holy Spirit to take over more and more of our lives. By Easter, we will be freer to rejoice in Him and be truly pleasing to God.


